

Visual Arts Body of Work Comparison of Dimensions


A body of work can comprise one or more individual pieces

- Rules for the body of work are on pages 45 to 49 of the Visual Arts Stage 6 Syllabus on the Board of Studies website.
- These rules apply to ALL bodies of work submitted for Visual Arts, whether they are marked corporately or itinerantly.
- ALL submissions need to comply with ALL of these rules when displayed for marking, whether the body of work is 2D, 3D or 4D, or a combination of these forms.
- Teachers and students are reminded that suggested submission formats and notes about each expressive form are included in the Visual Arts Stage 6 Syllabus.



Comparison of dimensions for maximum allowable volume of 1.0 cubic metre






The volume of a body of work is determined by the height, the width and the depth of the work when displayed for marking. This measurement applies to 3D works and/or submissions with 2D and 3D components.

Sculptural works should not include a flat fixed piece that exceeds 2 square metres in area.



Examples of length and breadth for allowable area of 2.0 square metres

2.20m x 0.91m	1.74m x 1.15m
$2.10m \times 0.95m$	1.66m x 1.20m
2.00m x 1.00m	$1.54 \text{m} \times 1.30 \text{m}$
1.90m x 1.05m	$1.48 \mathrm{m} \times 1.35 \mathrm{m}$
1.82m x 1.10m	$1.41 \mathrm{m} \times 1.41 \mathrm{m}$
